#### Course aims

The course aims - development of scientific knowledge, academic skills and practical skills in the interpretation and application of international and national legal regulations in the field of criminal law.

### Course outcome

Students are expected to: 1) understand the concept, subject, historical development, sources, structure and function of criminal law, 2) adopt knowledge of basic concepts, principles and institutes of general and special parts of criminal law - criminal offense, guilt, complicity, criminal sanction, 3) develop the ability to creatively and competently discuss with others on issues of criminal law, 4) develop the capacity of a systematic approach to the problems in the field of criminal law as well as to offer critical and reasoned answers in this field, 5) master key terms, concepts and institutes in the field of criminal law.

### **Course content**

Theory classes

1. Introduction to Criminal Law 2. Concept of criminal offense and act of criminal offense 3. Predictability in law 4. Invalidity 5. Criminal 6. Preparation and attempt of criminal offense 7. Criminal sanctions and Penalties 8. Warning measures, Security measures 9. Legal consequences conviction, rehabilitation and release of data from criminal records, amnesty or pardon, Obsolescence 10. Criminal sanctions against minors 11. Crimes against life and bodies 12. Criminal offenses against sexual freedom, marriage and family, intellectual property, 13. Criminal offenses against human health, Criminal acts against the environment, general safety of people and property, security of public transport, security of computer data 14. Criminal offenses against constitutional order and security of the Republic of Serbia, Criminal offenses against state organs 15. Other criminal offenses.

Practice classes In the practical part of the course students adopt practical knowledge by analysis of various cases in practice.

# Teaching methods
